GCW Philosophy and Rationale

The Global Citizenship Week program is designed to give students the experiences that will inspire them to become caring global citizens. Students will engage in sustainable service and/or gain awareness of issues that transcend national borders. They will develop an understanding of issues of poverty, indigenous peoples, and environmental degradation and preservation while simultaneously helping people or building up cultural awareness and sensitivity. Students will often plan and work as teams, strengthening their teamwork for a common goal of greater good.

GCW Course Objectives

As a result of participating in Global Citizenship Week students will:

- understand that humans have intrinsic worth regardless of differences
- be curious about and sensitive to human diversity, including the cultures of the host country
- work and communicate effectively and sensitively with people from diverse backgrounds, life styles, and cultures.
- understand that people, places, economies and environments are all inextricably interrelated and that choices and events can have an impact on a global scale.
- be aware of how their choices and decisions affect people and the environment
- appreciate and care about the environment and be committed to sustainable practices.
- take action to preserve and protect the environment.
- understand that social injustice is rooted in personal and cultural prejudice as well as socio-economic disparity.
- have concern for social injustice and inequality and affirm the rights and dignity of all people.
- take action to address social injustice

Global Citizenship Week Requirements as of 2010

With the introduction of a new program in 2010-11, students must meet the participation requirements listed below (see exception below):

1. All students must participate in at least one course in Thailand (category 1) during their high school career.

Rationale: Our host country is an amazing nation of warmth and diversity. In addition to learning more about Thailand students also have an opportunity to help those in need.

2. Students may only participate in one course outside of Asia (category 3) during their high school career.

Rationale: While there are wonderful learning opportunities outside of Asia, ISB students have a unique opportunity to learn more about the country and region in which they live. Additionally, by limiting the number of long distance courses we are able to minimize the environmental impact of the program by reducing our carbon footprint.

3. In order to participate in an out of Asia course (category 3), students must have first participated in a course within Thailand (category 1).

Rationale: This requirement ensures that students focus their GCW courses within Thailand and Asia. We want to ensure that students appreciate our host country before traveling further afield for a course.

Notes:

- REQUIREMENT # 2 does NOT apply to students in the class of 2013.
- Courses in the category of Career Exploration are NOT considered Category 1 courses, despite being in Thailand, as they do not promote host country awareness, community service, or focus on a global issue.
- Students may participate in category 2 (In Asia) courses before participating in a course within Thailand.

GCW CREDIT

Students who successfully complete their GCW course requirements will receive $\frac{1}{4}$ elective credit. GCW is a required course for graduation from ISB. Students will be graded on a Pass/Fail basis. All course requirements must be completed to receive credit. Partial credit will not be awarded.

GCW Risk Assessment and Safety Procedures Criteria

The nature and purpose of specific GCW courses may expose students to a degree of risk not typical of regular on-campus classes. Recognizing that courses involving travel, physical activity and exploration are not risk free, all courses are subject to a risk and safety assessment. The following criteria have been established in order to assess and minimize the potential risks associated with GCW courses. All courses are subject to the following:

1. Prior to departure, review of student health records shall be conducted. Parents will be required to inform course sponsors of any special health related issues regarding their child(ren).
2. Specific courses may require students to submit a medical clearance certificate and a physical.
3. Courses which require rigorous physical activity or special skills may require mandatory pre-course training or assessment. Such requirements will be stated in the course description.
4. Courses may not include destinations for which the U.S. State Department has issued a travel advisory.
5. Out-of-Bangkok courses must include emergency medical evacuation and insurance coverage for all participants. Such coverage will be included in the cost of each course. Courses shall not include activities for which appropriate insurance coverage is not available.
6. Competent medical personnel shall prepare first aid kits, appropriate to the nature and destination of each course.
7. Access to emergency medical care, communication availability, travel conditions, and evacuation procedures must be confirmed for all out-of-Bangkok destinations. Such information must be communicated to all participants and parents prior to departure.
8. Upon completion of a GCW course, each sponsor will submit a written evaluation concerning the quality of guides, travel conditions, safety standards, student/teacher ratio, and discipline matters. The administrator in charge will review each report.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

1. Read the GCW Program of Studies course offerings
2. Obtain parent approval BEFORE registering for any course
3. Meet requirements for their assigned course and pay a non-refundable, non-transferable deposit for this course
4. Attend ALL pre-course orientations and meetings
5. Fully and accurately complete the online registration process, including registration, physical exam, waiver, behavioral, and emergency treatment information
6. Submit a signed Parent Permission form
7. Students must communicate to parents ALL necessary information received during pre-course meetings
8. Remit course payment in full on the dates provided in the Timeline of Events. The last week for collection of final payments is the week of Nov. 26-30.
Students who do not make the payment dates may have their GCW privileges revoked by the school and be transferred to an in-Bangkok course
9. Fulfill all pre-course, course, and post-course requirements
10. Abide by faculty sponsor and school GCW expectations

PARENT RESPONSIBILITIES

1. Read the GCW Program of Studies to know the safety procedures, requirements, expectations, and to help child(ren) make considered choices
2. Optionally, attend the parent/student Course Fair held on September 24th, 26th, 28th, 2012
3. Complete Parent Permission Form and turn in to GCW sponsor by Tuesday, November 6, 2012

Behavioral Expectations

Safety and learning are the top priorities of the GCW program. As such, students may not inconvenience or hinder the learning of others, nor jeopardize the safety of the group members. Students must satisfy sponsors that they have the background to enjoy and participate in the course and they will be supportive of the group during the week.

If overnight course sponsors foresee identifiable exceptions to school travel (i.e. special meals, customs, etc), they will advise the Administrator in charge, and will inform students and parents of these exceptions.

Only medications listed and approved on the submitted physical forms will be accepted.

It is important to stress that there will be “zero tolerance” for the following behaviors during GCW activities and courses:

- Drug/alcohol use or possession
- Theft/vandalism
- Breaking curfew
- Smoking
- Actions that violate the laws of the host country
- Renting of motorized vehicles
- Use or possession of weapons

In each of these cases, students will be sent home at the parents’ expense if it is feasible to do so. When appropriate, the student will be placed in Supervised Study Hall on campus for the remainder of the week. Further consequences will be enforced upon return to ISB including requirements for the following year’s GCW.

Sponsors have full authority to dismiss from the course any student whose conduct is objectionable, harmful to the group, or reflects negatively on ISB. When conflict arises or conditions force changes in the itinerary, sponsors have jurisdiction to make final decisions.

GCW Showcase

The breadth and scale of this program requires an online solution to share photos and reflections from each course. Student reflections will appear in the course blogs and photos from all the courses can be found at the ISB High School Flickr account.

Common Assessments

We believe that the primary learning during GCW occurs during the course itself in the experiences and interactions that students will have with nature, the people they connect with, their sponsors, their fellow course participants and themselves. Experiential learning is best achieved and retained when students are given opportunities to reflect upon their learning.

To successfully pass the GCW course and earn 0.25 credit, each student must:

- Attend GCW planning and follow-up meetings
- Participate and engage fully in the activities and learning opportunities provided
- Complete and post on the GCW blog site a 500-word reflection on their learning (see section on Reflection guidelines)
- Assist the group in submitting and preparing photos and materials for the Erawan and The International publications

Additionally, some courses may have additional requirements as specified in the individual Course Descriptions in this Handbook.

The course sponsor will assess each student and assign a Pass or No Credit grade by or before March 22, 2012.

Student Reflection Guidelines

When writing their reflections, students should focus on their own learning that took place during the week. This can better solidify understanding and ensure that the learning extends beyond GCW and is retained beyond the week.

Students should consider:

- The relevance of what they learned
- How their learning connects to or conflicts with what they knew before
- How their learning will serve them in the future
- What further questions their learning has left them with
- What future solutions might be possible or should be pursued

Students can use the questions below to guide their reflection about the course. They do not have to answer all, but rather should use them to generate ideas and reflection.

1. What did you learn from this course...
 - a. about the global issue or community service project?
 - b. about the culture you were a part of?
 - c. about yourself?
2. How did you grow and/or change as a result of this course?
3. How was this experience similar to or different from what you had expected?
4. What was the most challenging part of this course?

Registration Requirements

Students will register according to their grade level (see Registration Process). In this process, most of the information required is completed online before submitting course selection preferences.

- Students must submit the parent permission form to GCW sponsor on November 6, 2012 (GCW meeting)
- Payments are made directly to any Bank Ayudhya branch (there is one near the Nichada Villa next to ISB). A payment slip with the account information will be provided.
- The number of participants in a course determines the final cost. As such, once a student is assigned, a student should not change courses. If a change becomes necessary, It is possible that some money will not be refunded in order to cover costs. It will remain included in the funds for the original course. All new costs associated with the new course must be paid in full.

Registration Guidelines

- Students may not select a course that they have already participated in during previous years.
- Courses are assigned based on the time of submission within the registration window for each priority level.
- Students are not assigned to courses “so that they can be with their friends.”
- When courses reach their maximum student number, that course will be closed, yet may still appear on the registration. This means it is very important that students specify ALL 5 top preferences in order when they submit their registration.

Registration Process

Priority Selection: All selections will be on-line.

1. First Priority - Seniors will select on October 5-8.
2. Second Priority - Juniors will select on October 9-14.
3. Third priority - Sophomores will select on October 15-17.
4. Fourth Priority: Freshmen will select on October 18-21.
5. Fifth Priority: Students who fail to complete the registration process will be assigned to available courses on October 29-31.

Fifth Priority: Any student who has not selected a course will be assigned to available courses on October 29-31.

I will not hold ISB, the course sponsor, or any designated supervisor responsible for any injury, accident, or damaging incident that may befall my son/daughter/ward which is not the result of any negligent act or willful default of any employee or agent of the School. Also, I accept full and complete responsibility for any expenses, claims, loss, or damage that ISB may incur as a result of any action or inaction of my son/daughter/ward and for all debts that he/she may incur and I agree to pay, upon demand, all transportation costs and related expenses that may occur if he/she must be returned to ISB as a result of illness not covered by insurance or for disciplinary action.”

FORM E Behavior Expectations

School-Sponsored Activities Rules and Regulations

Students and parents/guardians are required to read the Rules and Regulations for GCW.

1. Student Conduct

All ISB school rules are in effect during school-sponsored activities. Specific activities/trips will incorporate additional regulations and procedures to maintain the safety and welfare of students. Activity/trip sponsors will inform students and parents of any additional regulations or procedures.

Students in violation of major rules and regulations during a school sponsored activity will be suspended from the activity if on campus or in town, or sent home if feasible on an out of town or out of country trip. (Parents/Guardians will pay the cost of sending a student home). Additional disciplinary action will be applied in a timely manner. Disciplinary measures will be commensurate with the violation.

It is important to stress that there will be “zero tolerance” for the behaviors listed below during school sponsored activities and trips. This means that the trip sponsor and/or the school administration will discipline students violating the following in an appropriate manner, ranging from suspension to possible expulsion, and/or suspension from GCW and other overnight travel.

- Drug/alcohol use or possession
- Theft/vandalism
- Any unlawful acts
- Breaking curfew
- Breaking rules and procedures specific to an activity or trip or listed in the Student Handbook.
- Renting of motorized vehicles.
- Smoking

While on school-sponsored activities, it is expected that students conduct themselves in a polite and mature manner, remembering that they are representing their school.

The minimum consequences for alcohol use/possession are as follows:

- Suspension from school
- Probation
- Loss of overnight travel privilege

2. Free Time

Students have opportunities to sample wonderful Thai cuisine in all of its variety including at the peaceful setting of the Jim Thompson House.

Through a joint apprenticeship in the Lost Wax Casting industry, relationships will be built naturally as partners share mutual respect and cross cultural understandings. Together, students will learn about the scale of the wax casting industry to Jewelry production, observe skilled workers on fieldtrips to Zarren Jewelry Company and The Queen's Art School in Poe-Chang, Ban Mau. ISB host students will share their technical knowledge with their Thai partners who will, in turn, share their intricate Thai designs.

Daily group reflections give students the chance to share their learning, thinking and feelings with each other. Both ISB and their Thai guests will be empowered by learning a sophisticated and amazing casting technique that opens up career opportunities in Bangkok.

These opportunities will allow for an awareness of the unique culture of the region, develop a sense of stewardship for the environment and the effects of how our actions can affect others and their way of life. Beyond daily air con van travel, a train will take us from Bangkok to Baan Krud on day 1 and flight will return the group from Phuket to Bangkok on day 6. Accommodations will be 3 star shared rooms with all meals inclusive.

Life on the Mekong

As a result of participating in Global Citizenship Week students will:

- Understand that humans have intrinsic worth regardless of differences,
- Be curious about and sensitive to human diversity, including the cultures of the host country,

Course Description:

In this course, students will have the chance to discover and experience one of Thailand's most culturally diverse regions – the Golden Triangle. They will experience the culture and life of the local Hmong and Lahu villagers by making local handicrafts, participating in cultural performances, visiting the homes of the local villagers, and engaging in service projects such as teaching English at the local school, creating small irrigation dams, and planting trees. The primary service activity will be to work with the Hmong and Lahu communities to develop a nursery for the Mekong Giant Catfish, listed in The World Conservation Union as a critically endangered species. Students will also have the opportunity to enjoy the cool, lush, green, mountainous environment of the Golden Triangle through hiking, cycling, bird watching and star gazing.

Students will stay at Lanjia Lodge, an eco-friendly lodge run by Asian Oasis which is located inside a Hmong and Lahu village nestled on a hill overlooking the Mekong River and Laos. Built in traditional Hmong style with Western comforts, “Lanjia” means “peaceful” in the Hmong language. While there is plenty of activity in this course, we will also enjoy the peacefulness of our surroundings.

Phang Nga Bay Sustainable Ecotourism?

As a result of participating in Global Citizenship Week students will:

- Be curious about and sensitive to human diversity, including the cultures of the host country,
- Work and communicate effectively and sensitively with people from diverse backgrounds, lifestyles, and cultures,
- Understand that people, places, economies and environments are all inextricably interrelated and that choices and events can have an impact on a global scale,

- Learn and practice the skills of sea kayak paddling and navigation in coastal waters.

Course Description:

Phang Nga Bay is a beautiful area in southern Thailand. The focus of this trip is to learn about the environment of Phang Nga Bay as well as to interact with and learn from the local community. Students will be evaluating the sustainability of the ecotourism attractions visited. We will explore the area mainly in sea kayaks because they are easy to learn, quiet and environmentally safe, friendly and easy to balance, but we will also do some mountain biking and snorkeling in the crystal clear water of the shallow coral seas. We will take part in three community service projects: planting mangroves, working in a local school's organic garden, and beautifying a local beach. One night will be spent in a homestay with a local family – the best way to learn about the world they live in.

Experienced kayakers and naturalists lead each trip and host information sessions covering a different topic each evening. Paddling may seem difficult to learn initially as new muscles are used, but soon becomes a relaxing and enjoyable way to travel and observe wildlife. This is a course that would best suit students comfortable in and around water, who are physically fit and interested in the natural world and want to give back to the community we explore.

Habitat encourages concerned citizens like us to come together for a short period of time in volunteer groups called "Global Village Teams" to help construct homes for and with families in desperate need of housing. Students and their leaders will fly to either Chiang Mai (northern Thailand) or Udorn (northeast Thailand). After instruction in how to use various tools and how to lift and carry materials, students will help in the construction of two concrete block houses. Tasks will include mixing and carrying cement, pouring the floor, and building walls. The work will be tiring but rewarding! In addition, students will interact with the homeowners and Habitat staff and will also visit a school.

Course Description:

This six-day course in northern Thailand focuses on environmental responsibility, community service, cultural understanding and self-discovery. Students will stay at Lisu Lodge, nestled in a rich green valley only 40 min. from Chiang Mai Airport. This award winning Eco Lodge is built in traditional style and in close proximity to the local Lisu village. Students will participate in a variety of activities in the area surrounding the Lisu Lodge and village including community infrastructure projects, taking nature walks, participating in a reforestation project, visiting the local school, and interacting with the Lisu villagers. One day we will hike to the top of a mountain and spend a night at the Lahu outpost. There will be some adventure activities as well, including biking and white water rafting. The emphasis of the program will be on developing mindfulness of our relationships with nature, carrying out community service projects and building relationships with others.

We will also learn about the environmental issues of the region and the role that tourism and the government have played in the region's development. In addition, we will take two full day hikes and visit a school. Lodging and eating will be in traditional Karen homes throughout the week.

Requirements:

In order to participate in this course, students must:

- Have a reasonable degree of fitness – we will do several long hikes
- Be willing to "rough it" for 5 days living in the villages
- Be willing to help our hosts with cooking, cleaning, and other chores

Maekok River Village Community Service

As a result of participating in Global Citizenship Week students will:

- Take action to address social injustice by planning and teaching simple English or arts and crafts to local hill-tribe children and carrying out building projects within the school or local villages.
- Be curious about and sensitive to human diversity, including the cultures of the host country.
- Work and communicate effectively and sensitively with people from diverse backgrounds, lifestyles, and cultures.
- Understand that humans have intrinsic worth regardless of differences.
- Have concern for social injustice and inequality and affirm the rights and dignity of all people.

Course Description:

This is an ideal course for ISB students who enjoy outdoor activities, teaching, performing meaningful community service, and experiencing the natural beauty of northern Thailand. Students will spend 6 nights and 5 days doing a community service project in a local village near the town of Thaton. Our group will stay at the Maekok Village “Resort” - a complex built specifically for catering to student groups from around the world and owned by two former international school teachers. Students will spend 4 of the 5 days preparing and teaching daily English language lessons to the eager students of a nearby elementary school and completing a building or clean-up project at a local school. Students will interact with the local community, learn about the hill tribe culture, and lead the local elementary students in sports and activities. The Similans Marine Biology Course is one that will provide a “hands-on” opportunity for students to investigate marine biology. Students will cruise and live onboard a 100 foot ship designed for dive tours, and will dive at various sites off the coast of the Similan Islands National Marine Park, located in the Andaman Sea. Each day, students will have the opportunity to make up to four dives, including a night dive with certified dive masters. There is a fantastic wealth and variety of life in the Andaman Sea, and the students will see moray eels, angelfish, clownfish, sea snakes, and other types of fish and invertebrates, which inhabit the coastal reefs. The ecology of the various dive sites will be explained and investigated. Understanding of the impact of humans on the fragile reef ecosystem will be also examined. The biological relationships of the plants and the animals encountered will be described and discussed. Evenings will be spent discussing the days’ dives, talking over the experiences and planning the next days’ dives. Logbooks will be carefully maintained and daily journal entries will be made. Basic ecology and dive skills will be demonstrated and practiced. One of the dives will be an underwater clean-up dive to help students realize the impact that humans have on the ocean and its environment.

Operation Smile

Students will take part in the screening of Operation Smile candidates by organizing applicants and interacting with children to reduce anxiety. Once screenings are completed, ISB students will be invited to observe operations and to assist with the management of applicants pre and post-op. On the day immediately following scheduled operations, ISB students will again assist in organizing children's games and activities to reduce stress and post-operative stress.

On completion of their primary responsibilities to the Operation Smile program, students will engage in recreational and social events specific to the local area in order to gain a broader understanding of our host country culture. Students will be housed in double or triple rooms at the Centara Maesot Hill Resort.

Panya Project

Course Description:

This course is focused on gaining an understanding of and learning the skills for living sustainably. Transportation to and from Chiang Mai will be by overnight train. We will stay at the Panya Project, a 10-acre (four hectare) site situated in the low hills of northern Thailand, between the conventional rice/soy/corn farms of the local village and a beautiful expanse of second growth national forest. Panya features demonstrations of earthen buildings, composting toilet systems, and a medium scale water harvesting system, including a large dam at the top of the land and about 500 metres of swales. The project is also host to gardens and a diverse food forest, with over 40 varieties of fruit trees.

At Panya we will learn how to live sustainably in the wet/dry tropics. We will stay in dorms – one for boys and one for girls – and sleep under mosquito nets. We may be building mud brick structures, planting and harvesting vegetable crops, or cooking our own food. We will also take a rafting trip. But in all our activities, one thing is for sure: we will have lots of fun!

They will learn the skills and sensitivity required to communicate and prepare teaching materials appropriate to this group of population. They will realize the importance of making a difference in the lives of others.

Isaan Muay Thai Service Immersion Experience

The focus of your week will be the connection between Buddhism and Muay Thai and the way that the values of each co-exist within Thai culture. Starting some days shadowing the monks and learning their peaceful ways will help you stay grounded and mindful throughout the day. Learn the responsibilities of the monks firsthand and gain an intimate perspective of the Buddhist lifestyle before beginning your training. Following this, we train daily at a traditional gym in the classic art of Muay Thai, learning fitness and combat techniques indigenous to Thailand.

You will enjoy a first-rate sporting experience at the Udon Thani Sports University Gym, receiving collective and individual coaching from top trainers including a Muay Thai World Champion, a Muay Thai Thailand Champion and a former Olympic coach. You must be willing to train daily and engage in fairly intense exercise. However, no previous experience of Muay Thai is necessary, as coaches will adapt to individual needs and cater for beginners as well as more seasoned martial artists.

But the trip is not all hardship! We will stay at the very comfortable Ricefields Base, a resort-like hotel nestled in the beautiful Isaan countryside. The sleeping arrangements will be to a high standard, with 4-6 students per room. Each room has AC, top-quality mattresses, and tasteful decor. There are no bunk beds. Each bedroom has its own bathroom, and there are extra bathrooms in the main room of the house. Linens and towels will be provided. Facilities include a swimming-pool, Ping-Pong table and outdoor gym.

In this week-long learning adventure, we will set out to embrace new and unfamiliar parts of our new “Home” and our extended “Family” in Bali. Students will engage with a new culture through art exploration, Canang making (traditional Balinese offerings), Batik painting, Wayang Kulit (Shadow Puppets), Kecak dance performance and cultural exchanges with local inhabitants in Ubud. Students will share rooms at a three-star hotel (between 3-4 per room). We then will dive into an inspirational tropical wilderness that both challenges and provides time for reflection. The Odyssey Institute’s (OI) Tropical Ecology Adventure Center (TEAC) lies on the shore of West Bali National Park - the last remaining piece of tropical wilderness in Bali. Students will sleep in tents (2-3 people per tent). We will visit and snorkel at Menjangan Island, home to the most pristine coral reefs in all of Indonesia. Sea turtles, manta rays, barracuda, and moray eels are commonly spotted! Then follows a savannah/monsoon forest trek during which students will take part in a number of teambuilding and survival challenges at an open beachside area, which will be capped off by supporting a sustainable livelihood initiative run by OI in West Bali. On our return to Ubud, students will be presented with optional activities such as: market visit/shopping, swimming, reflexology/head and shoulder massage, and Yoga. We’ll spend our final night in Bali with a banquet dinner and cultural performance at the spectacular Five Elements.

Course Description:

This course will introduce students to a pristine Himalayan country, and a peaceful historically rich Buddhist culture thriving amidst modernization. Bhutan’s ancient land surviving in a modern world is truly a Shangri-La. Students will experience and understand the issues related to indigenous populations trying to maintain their cultural heritage in the face of globalization, recent democratization, and economic challenges.

The trip features outdoor adventure activities such as camping, short and long treks, traditional hot stone bath, and the Bhutanese national sport of archery. These activities will also enable us to move in closer to the local population (and yaks) and be true world travelers. We will trek throughout the countryside and observe Bhutanese life, varied vegetation zones, the unique dzongs (beautiful government / monastery buildings), and nature first hand. There will be opportunities for appreciating the arts, shopping in the city, and the magnificent Himalayan landscape upclose. Sleeping arrangements while camping (2-3 nights) will be with another student of the same gender. Other (3-4 nights) accommodations will be in 4- or 5-star hotels in the ‘big city’ of Paro or Thimpu. This trip includes some of the highland (maybe 3,500 meters) areas, and requires an appropriate level of fitness. Bhutan is for students seeking cultural and geographical wonder in a magnificently unique land.

Eco-experience: Laos

As a result of participating in Global Citizenship Week students will:

- Be curious about and sensitive to human diversity, including the cultures of the host country, Laos.
- Communicate effectively and sensitively with people from diverse backgrounds, lifestyles, and cultures.
- Be aware of how their choices and decisions affect people and the environment.
- Take action to preserve and protect the environment.
- Appreciate and care about the environment and be committed to sustainable practices.

Course Description:

This eco-experience explores how village people and other living things relate to their environment, and includes camping, kayaking, trekking and ziplining! The first half of the trip is spent paddling through the '4,000 islands' ([Si Pan Don](#)) created where the Mekong braids to 14 km. wide, and then navigating some of the largest waterfalls (more water than Niagara). We'll paddle above and below two thundering waterfalls, and spend time in the open water near the Cambodian border watching dolphins feed. We'll interact with the local people as they plant and fish. The second half of the trip is spent trekking and [ziplining in Champasak Province](#), Dong Hua Sao National Park, traversing steep gorges in touching distance to the waterfalls. At least one night is spent in the treetops at the Jungle Hotel Paksong. While in Champasak, we will have a first-hand look at sustainability in the jungle, experiencing clean energy in this pristine environment, and learning about waste filtering and wildlife and nature preservation. Overnights also include at least one village homestay (sleeping in pairs/threes in local village homes and camping 2-3 per tent). This is the second half of a 17-day trip Outside Magazine called "one of 48 trips of a lifetime"!

It offers the thrill of coming face to face with orangutans in the wild and learn how these legendary 'people of the forest' are facing extinction in the wild and what they can do to help prevent this.

Students will trek through the world's oldest and richest rainforest in Southeast Asia's largest national park and learn the dangers facing these fragile environments. Students will study the unique geology of the region as they climb through breath taking cloud forests into the steaming caldera of an active volcano, raft down a jungle river and plunge into the crystal clear waters of the world's largest crater lake – Lake Toba which is over 100km long.

The fascinating Batak Karo and Batak Toba cultures of northern Sumatra will be the indigenous focus of this trip as we visit their ancestral homelands on the scenic shores of Lake Toba. Students will have the opportunity to visit a school and teach the local children. Come join us on this unforgettable learning adventure to the world's sixth largest island.

Due to the limited number of flights going to Medan we have to fly via Singapore. On the Friday we depart, we spend that night in Singapore airport. We try to book rooms in the airport hotel, but on the last trip (2012) we had to camp out in the airport – all part of the adventure. On Sumatra the accommodation is clean but simple. Students of the same gender will share a room and on occasions this may be a large double bed.

Course Description:

Sichuan is one of China's most important remaining nature reserves, and has long served as a last bastion for many of China's endangered animals, most iconic of which is the wild giant panda. This course will provide students with the opportunities to explore both the abundant ecological wildlife and the rich culture of western China.

Students will focus on environmental issues as they participate and assist in environmental research projects conducted on water and biogas. Students will also have the rare opportunity to work closely with scientists protecting, caring for, and breeding pandas in Sichuan's panda sanctuaries.

Students will also immerse in Chinese culture with tai-chi sessions, traditional Sichuan performances, and ancient historical sites.

Throughout this course students will find themselves amazed at the magnificent nature and the exquisite culture of western China.

Course Description:

In this course, students will visit Nepal, an ancient mountain kingdom home to many of the world's highest peaks and a land rich in history and cultural diversity.

We begin our adventure on Saturday with a direct morning flight to Kathmandu on Thai Airways, a breathtaking journey past Mount Everest and the Langtang Range of the Himalaya. After our arrival in the bustling Kathmandu valley, we fly to the beautiful mountain town of Pokhara, the launching point for our trek. For the next four days, we will learn firsthand about Nepal's fragile mountain ecosystem while hiking along the famous Annapurna Circuit, widely considered by experts to be one of the best treks in the world. This reputation is due to the majestic natural beauty of the trail and the unusually close proximity hikers have to some of the highest snowcapped peaks on earth. Trekking for 5-7 hours per day with our Nepali guides, we will reach the vantage point of Poon Hill, which on a clear morning affords stunning panoramic views of the Annapurna range. While we take in the natural beauty, we will also learn stories, songs, and local customs of the mountain region in the evenings with our Nepali friends as we warm ourselves by the fire. Mountain accommodations are two-person bedrooms in rustic "tea houses"; students will sleep in sleeping bags sharing a room with one other person of the same gender.

On Thursday, we fly to Kathmandu where we will experience the rich cultures and religions of the subcontinent. We will stay at a comfortable hotel in Thamel and students will share a room with one other person. We will meander through Hindu temples, shop at ancient markets, circle the great stupa at Boudhanath, sample the local cuisine, and visit a painting school. For many ISB students, the highlight of this GCW course is not the mountains but instead the opportunity to participate in community service work with elementary age students at the Moonlight Foundation School, a school for poverty-stricken children established and run by Santosh Kolrala, our experienced trekking guide. Each ISB student will serve as a mentor as they jointly participate in educational experiences at the school and in various locations around Kathmandu. Many students have expressed their satisfaction with this service experience because it gave them the opportunity to give back to the people of this amazing land.

On Saturday, after an adventurous and fulfilling week in Nepal, we return to Bangkok.

Vietnam: Mekong Delta Community Service Experience

As a result of participating in Global Citizenship Week students will:

- Be curious about and sensitive to human diversity, especially the cultures of the Mekong delta of Vietnam
- Work and communicate effectively and sensitively with people from diverse backgrounds, lifestyles, and cultures,
- Understand that people, places, economies and environments are all inextricably interrelated and that choices and events can have an impact on a global scale,
- Be aware of how their choices and decisions affect people and the environment,
- Appreciate and care about the environment and be committed to sustainable practices,
- Understand that social injustice is rooted in personal and cultural prejudice as well as socio-economic disparity,
- Have concern for social injustice and inequality and affirm the rights and dignity of all people,
- Take action to address social injustice.

Course Description:

This course will allow students to experience Vietnamese culture, allow them to see the fascinating ways of life in the Mekong delta and engage in a rewarding community service project. After flying to Saigon on Saturday afternoon and spending the night there, the tour starts with a bus ride to Cai Be where we visit a floating market and handicraft village. From Cai Be we board a boat for a cruise along the waterways of the Mekong delta. We will stop along the way to visit gardens, pottery and brick makers, candy making and pop rice making shops. The destination for the cruise is Chau Doc village where our community service project is located. We will arrive in time for dinner. After a morning of cultural exchanges with the local villagers and visiting their artisan and weaving centers we will spend the afternoon working at the project site. The next morning will be spent visiting the Tra Su Nature Reserve, a 845 hectare ecological haven for many beautiful and fascinating animals and plants. In the afternoon we will return to our building site to continue the project. The next few full days will be spent at the work site. Thursday morning we will finish our building project, bid farewell to the villagers and return to Saigon where we will stay the night. Then home Friday morning to Bangkok. Students will experience a beautiful part of southern Vietnam as well as participate in an engaging and helpful community service project. Each night the accommodations are in 3 star hotels with students of the same gender sharing a room. Most of the meals will be at the hotel.

Course Description:

This is a once in a lifetime experience— a 3 day trek and service in the Indian Himalayas with a possible audience with His Holiness, the 14th Dalai Lama, Tenzin Gyatso—and an opportunity to experience first-hand, the culture and environment of the Tibetan refugee community in the town of McLeod Ganj, Northern India. McLeod Ganj is the residence of the Dalai Lama and the Tibetan government in exile, and is an important learning center for Tibetan Buddhism. We spend the first few days and nights in McLeod Ganj, visiting various temples and art centers, including the residence of the Dalai Lama, where we hope to meet with him. Monday and Tuesday we move to Dharamsala, for our service activities with the Nishtha Rural Health, Education and Environment Centre, a rural health clinic and community center. Activities will be tied to the health and education of children and their parents, and care for the environment. In the evenings, we are likely to hear a Tibetan activist, watch traditional Tibetan dance and learn more about Tibetan culture. Wednesday through Friday are devoted to a 3-day trek (3-5 hours per day with altitudes of around 3000 meters) taking in the beauty of the environment with views of the Dhauladhar mountains. The trekking includes two nights of camping in tents with campfires and stories. The weather can be quite cool in the evening, with the potential for snow so the exact trekking route is yet to be determined. On Thursday, we travel overnight by train back to New Delhi, where we will have the day to explore before departing on a late overnight flight arriving Bangkok Saturday morning.

Japan: In Pursuit of Peace

Course Description:

This course focuses on the theme of war and peace, and, in particular, the significance of nuclear weapons in our globalized world. After arriving in Fukuoka, students will transfer to Nagasaki, where they will visit the Nagasaki Peace Memorial Park and attend a workshop for peace study at Nagasaki University. The course then moves to Hiroshima. Since the 1945 atomic-bombing, Hiroshima has been imparting its message of seeking peace in the world, and students will meet with atomic-bomb survivors in the Peace Memorial Museum. They will also hear first-hand accounts of the impact of the atomic-bomb. After visiting Hiroshima, the tour moves on to Miyajima, a World Heritage shrine, continuing to beautiful Kyoto, home of 17 World Heritage sites. Students will learn how people in each district have been collaborating to promote their traditional cultural and environmental heritage.

Course Description:

Part of the week we will stay in the boarding facilities at International School Moshi (ISM) while taking part in the school's extensive community service program supporting national primary and secondary schools in the Kilimanjaro region. You will take part in improving educational opportunities for the children in this region either by helping to build classrooms using educational games to teach local children in their schools, or by offering support at regional orphanages.

The school, situated on a 50-acre campus at the foot of Mt. Kilimanjaro, will provide us with our own 30-bed facility designed for visiting school groups, a dining hall for our meals and snacks, along with the use of the school's IT/media center, a 25m swimming pool and tennis, football, and basketball courts.

We will also camp on safari with visits to Ngorongoro Crater National Park and either Lake Manyara or Tarangire National Park. We camp on the crater rim overnight and have a safari drive in the crater itself starting early the following morning. In addition to Africa's animals, Ngorongoro also enables visitors to view the life of the Maasai and visit a Maasai cultural center to see an alternative culture and lifestyle. The safari usually includes a visit of Olduvai Gorge, an archaeologically renowned area for the discovery of historically famous fossils by Mary Leakey in 1959. Details will be posted to the GCW Tanzania 2013 Website.

Students will spend the week on the North Island of New Zealand, where they will experience Maori culture by: living in Maori tribal compounds; participating in Maori welcoming rituals; helping prepare traditional Hangi dinners; creating traditional Maori artwork with guidance from our Maori hosts; and camping on a sacred Maori island. Our environmental learning will focus on reforesting native-species habitat; swimming with dolphins; and learning about the impacts of the Rena oil spill off the Bay of Plenty coast. Outdoor activities will include whitewater rafting, mountain biking in a managed-forest environment, and hiking. Accommodation for the trip will be in Maori marae (traditional villages), where students will sleep as a large group in Maori meeting halls; in same-gender tents on our island camp; and in cabins. Students will help cook, clean, and fully participate in all logistic areas of the trip.

From there it is time to head south to the High Atlas Mountains, the tallest mountain range in North Africa. From the waterfall, Cascades d’Ouzoud to a rustic Berber village in the Ait Bougamez valley, where we will stay in a family run guesthouse and prepare for our community service. While there, we will meet the needs of the local community by assisting the local villagers with infrastructure projects, including the local girls school.

Morocco is known for its hospitality and last year we were welcomed into the homes of locals to taste the foods and experience the culture firsthand. One can also explore native forestry and landscape, which like much of the world, has changed with modernization.

Continuing on, we move to back Casablanca to explore this ancient and modern metropolitan city. Later we will head back to Marrakech to have dinner in the Jemaa el-Fnaa, spending time in the Koutoubia Mosque and viewing a local craftsman cooperative.

This trip has it all, with sightseeing across the countryside, shopping at local markets, inviting natural surroundings and a chance to touch the lives of youth that will resonate through time. Be a part of the days and nights that will be filled with Moroccan Delights.

Teacher Internship

As a result of participating in Global Citizenship Week students will:

- Design a teaching project.
- Develop skills to work with a small group of students.
- Reflect on the qualities and skills necessary to be a teacher.
- Help plan and/or teach a lesson with approval from the supervising teacher.
- Complete clerical tasks as assigned by supervising teacher.

Course Description:

During this course, participants will serve a one-week apprenticeship under the guidance of a Primary or Intermediate (Elementary School), or Middle School “Supervising Teacher”. Students will begin their active role of “Teacher Apprentice” by observing their supervising teacher and reflecting on those qualities needed to teach successfully at the assigned level. Based on a pre-teaching discussion with their supervising teachers, students will devise a “teaching project” which might include any or all of the following: planning and teaching a lesson; working with individual students, small groups and/or classes; participating in classroom management activities such as attendance taking, monitoring, distributing and marking evaluations, etc.; clerical tasks such as creating displays, typing, copying, and collating materials, etc.; possibly working with elementary students on the Elementary School Musical, or any other task(s) normally involved in the teaching process.

Requirements:

In order to participate in this course, students must:

Pre-course Requirements:

- Participate in pre-course meetings with sponsors.
- Write a Letter of Introduction to their Supervising Teacher.
- Meet with and observe supervising teachers in their classroom and design a “teaching project.”

General Requirements:

- Possess the desire and enthusiasm to take a leadership role in a Primary or Middle School classroom.
- Possess the ability to communicate effectively in English.

Post Course Requirements:

Upon completion of GCW, students will:

- Write a 500-word reflection, upload it to their personal blogs, and tag it so that it appears on the GCW course blog.
